



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#### MY DAD



Several of you attended my dad's Celebration of Life on 10/7/2023. Thank you for all the cards, prayers, support and love during the week leading up to the service (and after). And the very large, beautiful flower arrangement that graced the sanctuary. Thank you! I thought I would share what I learned from my dad with all of you:

Dad taught us to have fun. Dad wasn't a very tall man and he wasn't very athletic, but when we were small, he used to lay flat on the living room floor. We would crawl all over him, poke him and tickle him and he would play right back. It was a game we called rassle-dassle. I don't know how, but once in a while Dad actually fell asleep in the middle of this game, maybe because he was so tired.

Dad taught me to have a good work ethic. There were times I can remember Dad worked three jobs: purchasing clerk at the Reading Railroad, a part-time job at Arby's down the street, and he sold Amway products on the side. I imagine it was a stretch financially for our parents to make the move from NE Philadelphia to Feasterville when I was ten. We had only one car, so every weekday, Dad would leave while it was still dark to walk down to Somerton train station so Mom could have the car during the day. Then us kids would pile in the car to go pick him up at 5:00 and bring him home for the evening.

Dad taught me about honor. He served his country in the US Army, stateside during the Korean War. He ALWAYS stood and saluted as the local 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade opened with the honor guard. I think I can even remember him standing in the living room before Phillies games while the national anthem was sung. Thanks for your service, Dad.

Dad taught me about care-giving and nurturing. Mom was quite sick for the last 4 years of her life. I can still picture my dad kneeling in front of her, emptying her ileostomy bag and replacing it with a new one. He took such good care of her and loved her so much.

Dad taught me about taking it slow. He had a deliberate, meticulous way of doing things, even to the extreme of putting the tinsel on the Christmas tree one strand at a time. And taking it off that same way and carefully wrapping it around its original cardboard so it could be used the next year. He wrote with neat, tiny printing and loved to document things. His yearly calendar is a treasure of little notes and happenings. Always organized, sometimes in a weird way in some of the items he saved, he researched his family tree and gave us kids notebooks with his notes so we would always know where we came from. If you ever wanted to get anywhere in a hurry, don't get in dad's car! He would never, EVER go over the speed limit! He was one of those cars you see moving slowly in the right lane while everyone else is passing on the left.

Dad taught me about faithfulness. As I mentioned in a recent sermon, Dad was the spiritual leader of our family and I appreciate that. Even when a snow-storm would keep us from traveling to Trevose Methodist, Dad would "have church". We'd sing a few hymns around the piano with mom playing, he would read scripture and give a little talk. Dad took the scriptures seriously. He preferred we call him Dad or Daddy, as he believed and taught that we have one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, with a capital F, who is over all and through all and in all, from Ephesians 4:5 & 6. And on Christmas morning, we weren't allowed into the living room until we heard the Christmas story from the gospel of Luke. And when we were finally allowed in – Oh, those flood lights on his movie camera were blinding!

Dad taught me to be an encourager. He always let me know how proud he was of all of us kids. He was rather astounded to have two pastors in his family and was equally proud of Loriann and Linda who are working in careers that serve others.

Dad taught me to never take life for granted. He was more than a little surprised to be alive at his age, especially since his dad had died young. Our dad never expected to live past 60. Well, surprise, dad! God blessed you with many more years. Lori showed me a note on his calendar this last birthday. He had marked September 10<sup>th</sup> – my birthday, if I'm still alive. That was our dad, with his wacky sense of humor. We never hung up from a phone call without him telling me he loved me. In fact, in recent years, he had adopted my mom's favorite good-bye "love you lots!" And, if I said, see you later, his catch phrase was always 'God willing.'

So, thank you Dad, for teaching us how to love Jesus' way and always being there for all of us. We will miss you terribly, but you taught us to trust in God's promise that we will see you and Mom again. God Willing. Love you, Daddy.

MISSIONS We sponsor two children through the World Vision organi-CORNER zation. World Vision is a global Christian humanitarian orcommunities to reach their full potential by tackling the causes of poverty and injustice. World Vision was started in the 1950's helping one little girl with \$5 in his pocket by founder, Bob Pierce. Today, World Vision helps more

than 3.5 million children in nearly 100 countries.

Zeinab is an 11-yearold girl living in the Lamu Assessment Project in Kenya, Af-Zeinab speaks rica. Boni and her birthday is on August 16<sup>th</sup>. Her favorite hobby is jumping rope and her favorite subject in school is Science. In Lamu, the landscape

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is forested and surrounded by seasonal rivers. Many families are dependent on agriculture and livestock for food and income, but irregular rainfall and land degradation have left Kenya vulnerable to drought. A typical diet consists of cereal grains, rice, vegetables and fish, when available.

The HIV and AIDS crisis has severely damaged the social fabric of the entire community, leaving many children without parents. The Lamu community is currently in an Empowerment phase where local leaders and families take on more ownership and selfsufficiency grows. The community and children grow stronger and healthier thanks to large improvements in areas like clean water, education, nutrition, and more.

Enderson Aaron is a 9-year-old boy living in Proyecto CESP Pantasma, Nicaragua. Enderson speaks Spanish and his birthday is on August 26<sup>th</sup>. His favorite hobby is playing ball games and his favorite subject in school is coloring. Pantasma is a small, fertile valley in western Nicaragua, where many people earn a living raising cattle or growing crops like coffee, bananas, and citrus. Though families grow nutritious foods like beans and corn, they mostly sell what they produce and can't keep enough to feed themselves year-round: Nearly one in five children under age 5 are chronically malnourished. People aren't well educated about the importance of good hygiene behaviors, and they don't always have access to proper sanitation. Up to half of households don't have a way to get clean water, which contributes to preventable illnesses. Most children don't get the chance to attend preschool, and less than one in five teenagers leave school with vocational or career training: The lack of these opportunities limits future success. Too many students must drop out of school to help their families make ends meet by working in the fields. Kids are also vulnerable to other forms of exploitation or abuse, and over half of teenagers report not feeling safe from violence in their homes. Families are also not well prepared for disasters or catastrophes such as the economic crisis caused by the



COVID-19 pandemic, which can push already-vulnerable families deeper into poverty. The community is in a Planning phase where they identify their greatest challenges and develop an action plan. The community nominates vulnerable children for sponsorship.

We also sponsor a missionary through Wycliffe Ministry. Aileen Agoncillo is a Team Development Specialist and currently works at Wycliffe headquarters in Florida.



As a Team Development Specialist, Aileen comes alongside teams and individual staff in helping meet development needs. The goal is to come alongside staff in develop-

ing teams that work better together and are more effective in their work for the furtherance of the Bible translation ministry. As part of her ministry with Wycliffe, Aileen brings her training as a Spiritual Director and her qualification as a GRIP-Birkman Certified Professional.

Over her years of ministry with Wycliffe since 2002, Aileen has served in Bible translation using her skills in media and communications based in the United States and Asia. She also provided leadership to Wycliffe USA's prayer engagement and church partnership strategies.

Aileen's ministry with Wycliffe is dependent on a ministry team of prayer and financial partners. Aileen is currently strengthening the team of financial and prayer partners who invest in her Wycliffe ministry. Aileen is grateful for those who have partnered with her, making her Wycliffe ministry possible.




